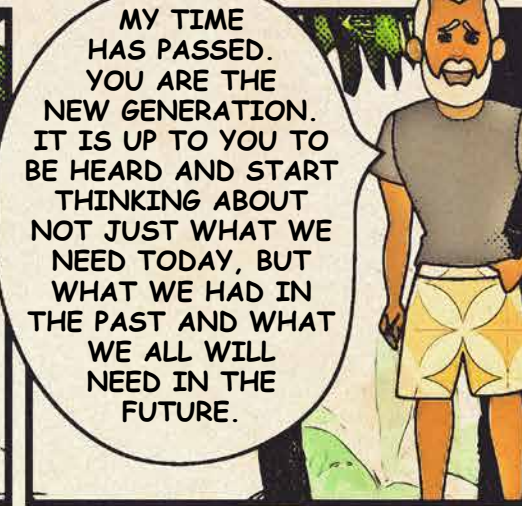
MAIREROA GREW SILENT AND THEN SPOKE SOFTLY...

WELL, ACTUALLY, I HAVE NO IDEA.



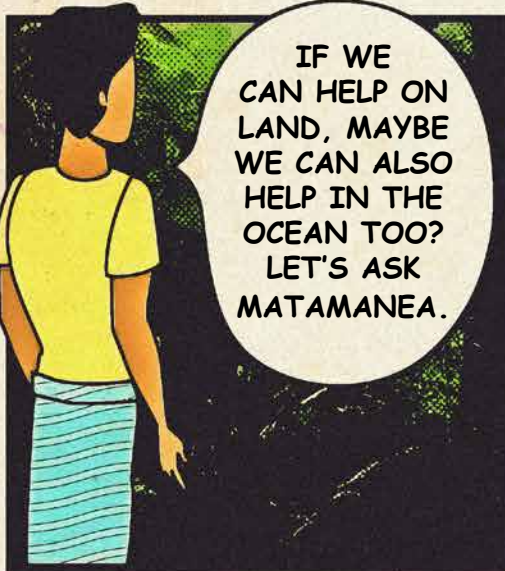

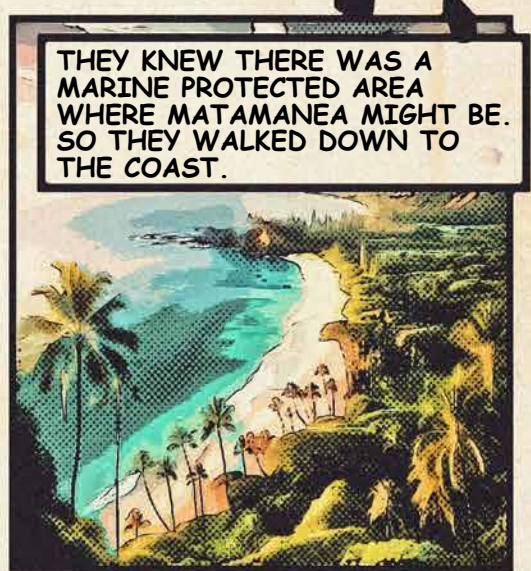

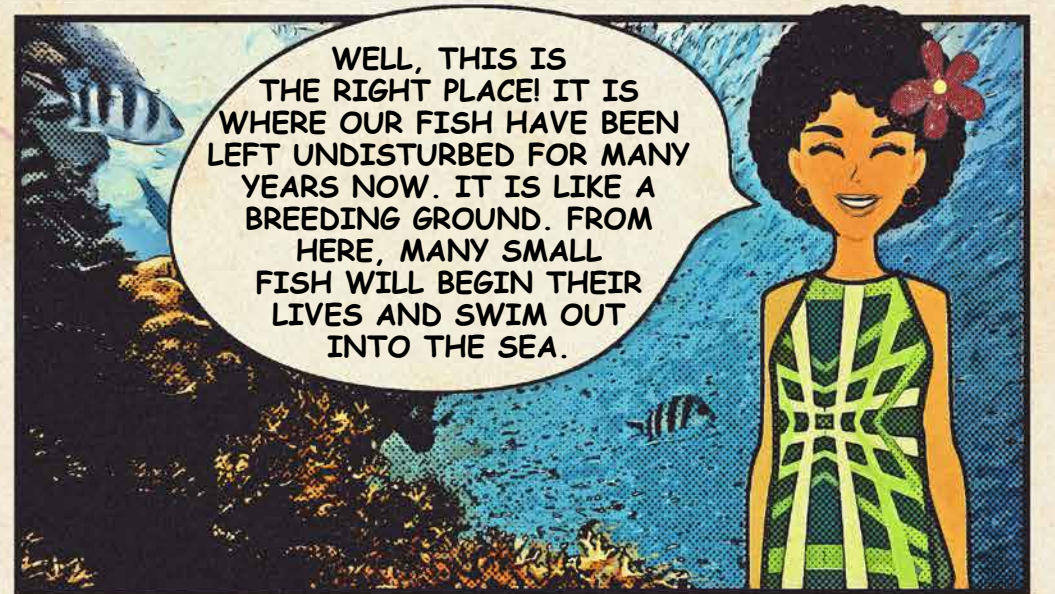
THEY CAME TO A SIGN ON THE SHORELINE AND STARTED READING UNTIL THEY HEARD A VOICE BEHIND THEM.

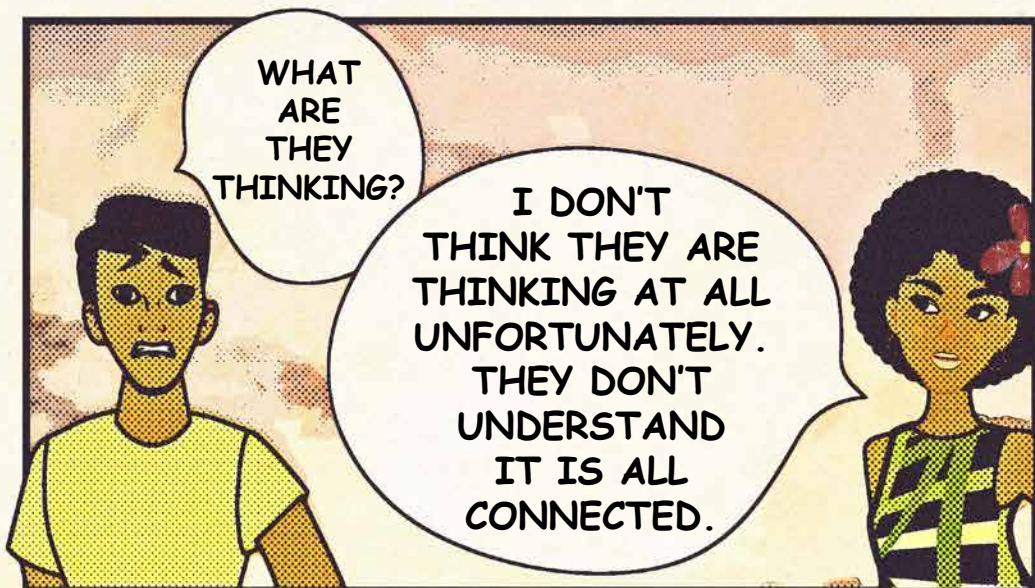

BUT I SEE MORE AND MORE PLASTIC AND RUBBISH WASHING UP HERE?

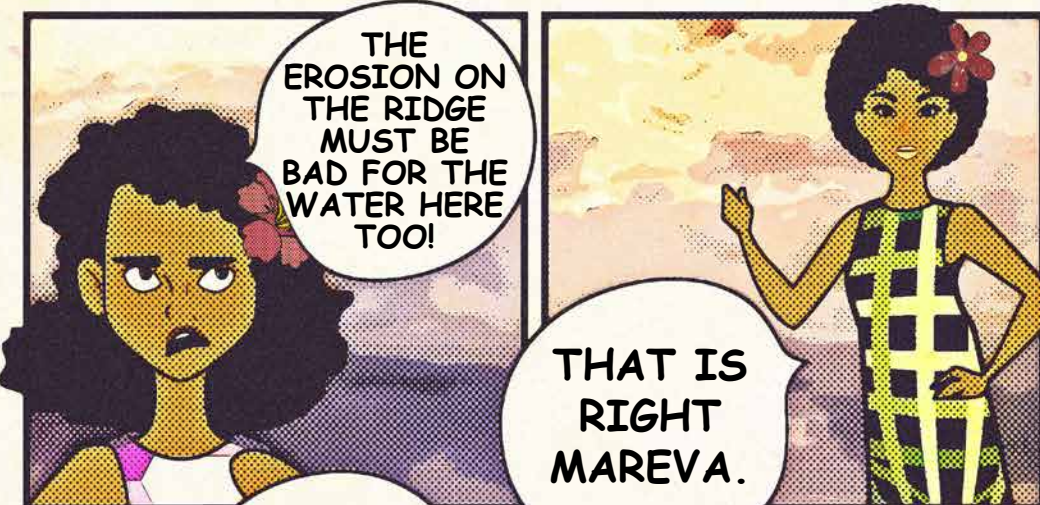


YES. PEOPLE IN TOWN DROP THEIR RUBBISH. THEN THE RAIN BRINGS IT INTO THE OCEAN.



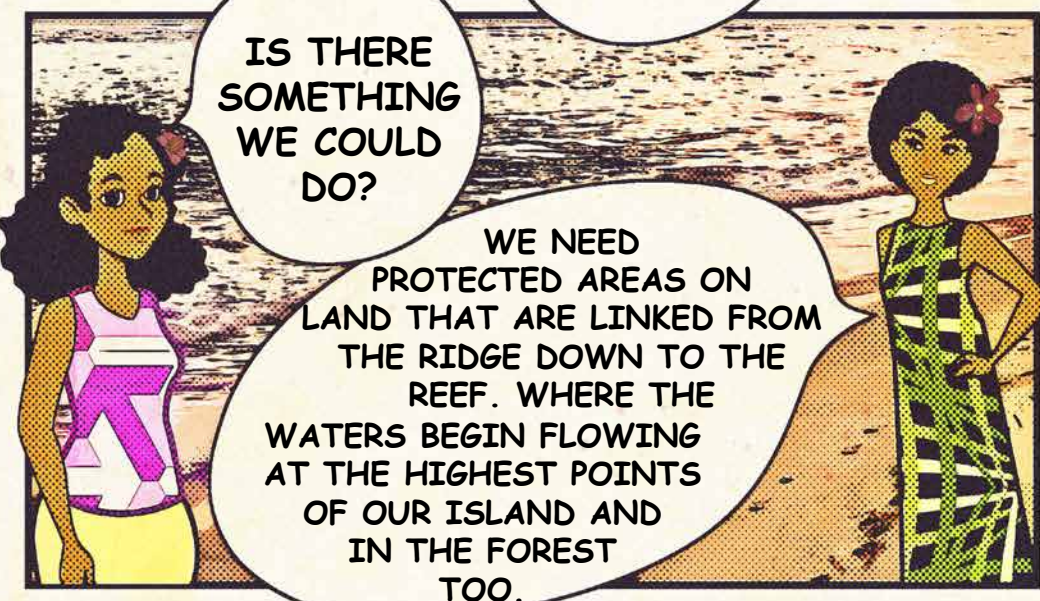

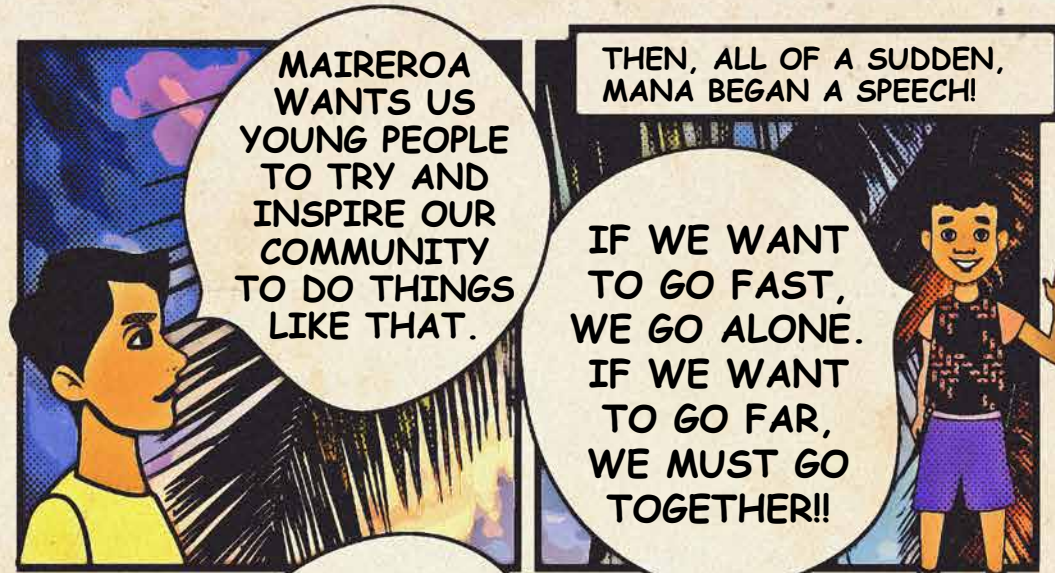

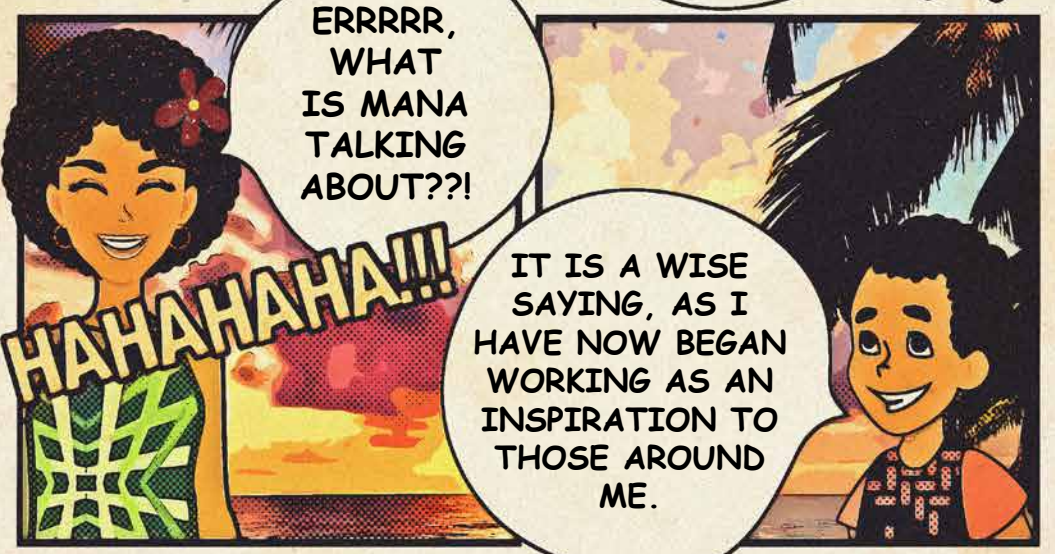

THEN, ALL OF A SUDDEN, MANA BEGAN A SPEECH!

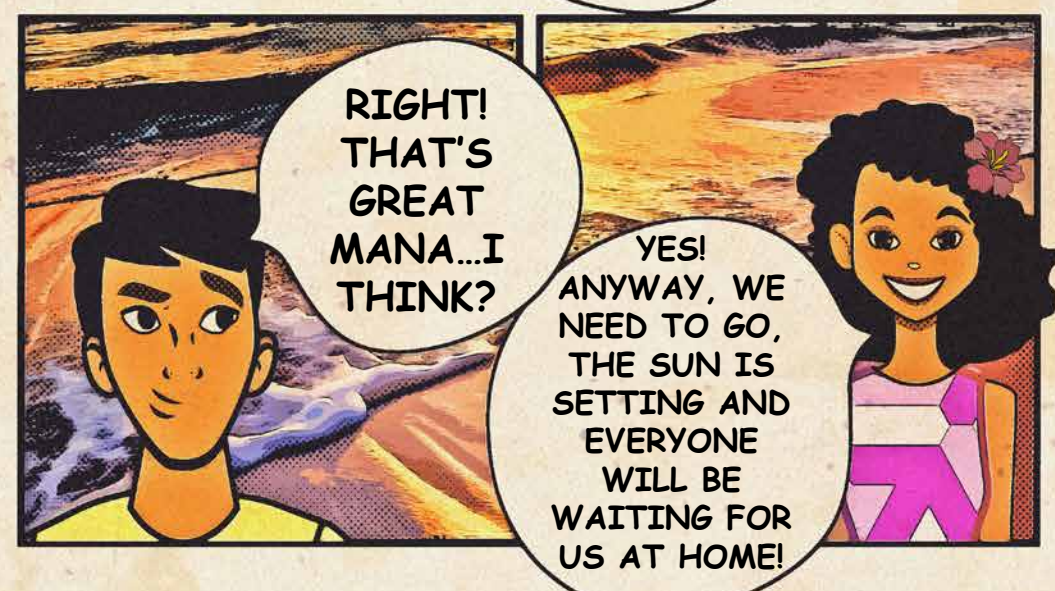

YES! WE NEED TO BE VERY CAREFUL TO CONTROL WHAT COMES INTO OUR COUNTRY FROM OUTSIDE.



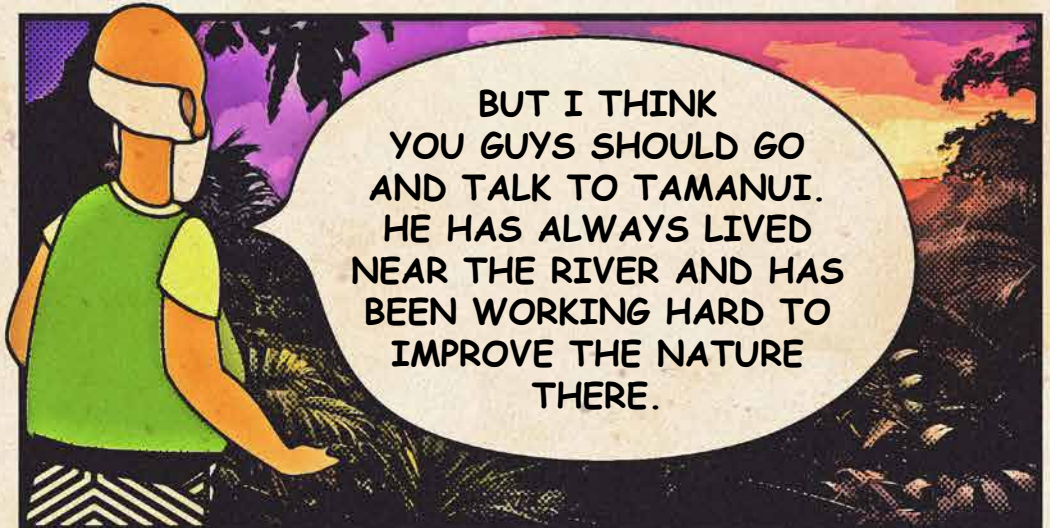

Implementing robust monitoring and evaluation frameworks to measure the impact of youth engagement initiatives and adapt strategies accordingly.

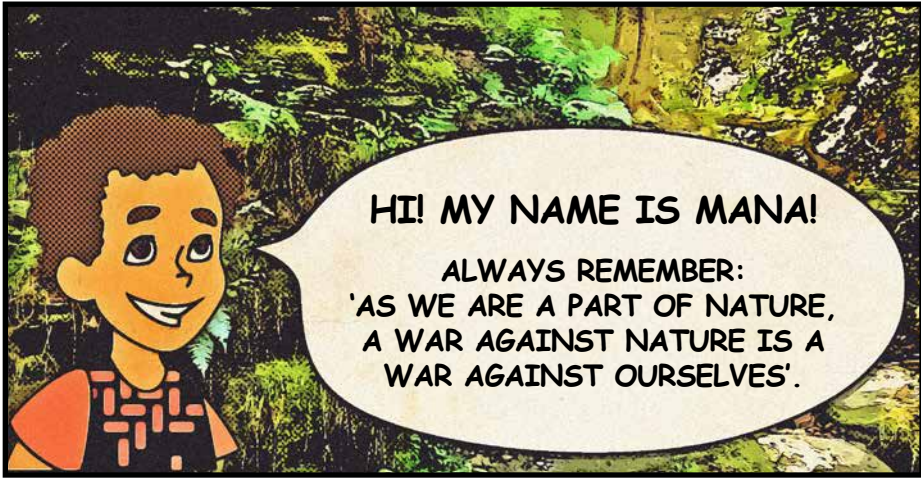
What you need to know about PIRT
